

Name on Stone: Warren family (William, Harriet, Addie, etc.)

Dates: 1901, 1919, 1883, etc.


Iconography Description: Palm frond:  
Roman victory symbol repurposed into  
Christian victory over death.



Name(s): John and Ann Kelly, and Edward Kelly (d. 1862 Battle of Winchester)

Dates: d. 1879 and 1846


Iconography: Obelisk, embellished



Name(s): William and Ann Kewish

Dates: (d. 1841 and 1835)


Iconography: marble pedestal, missing urn?



Name on Stone: William Corlett

Dates: d. 1865

Iconography Description: clasped hands,  
Same cuffs on both hands?



Name: William W. Carran


Dates: d. 1863 at Triune, TN

Iconography: eagle, shield, battle standards

“Dulce est decorum pro patriae mori”

From Horace, “It is sweet and proper to die

For one’s country.”



Name: Mary Brogden

Dates: d. 1843

Iconography: Memento Mori poem:

Friends, as you pass by,

As you are now, so once was I

As I am now, so you must be


Prepare for death and follow me.



Name on Stone: Asa Stiles (2<sup>nd</sup> owner of Cemetery before selling to city)

Dates: d. 1834


Iconography Description: Willow and urn  
In neoclassical tradition.

Date: ?


Iconography: treestone, possible Woodsmen

Name: Elenor Honnisett

Date: d. 1880

Iconography: clasped hands, different cuffs  
(one male, one female)




Names: Katarina and Sylvester Knittel

Dates: d. 1185 and d. 1901

Iconography: treestone, probably

Victorian decorative, other symbols?




Name: Truman and Catherine Kent
